Dr. Quentin & Mary Knauer



Quentin Knauer was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. during the depression, a second generation American who grew up with a learned financial restraint the result of the lean years of his youth. Quentin's father was a dentist, and it was from his compassion for his patients that Quentin learned the work ethic of friendly service. Quentin was a Cub Scout as a boy, attended public school and later majored in pre-med at Hamilton College in upstate New York. He attended medical school at Western Reserve School of Medicine in Cleveland, graduating in 1958, followed by pathology and surgical residencies.

Quentin met his wife, Mary Bellerjeau Knauer, when both were doing missionary work in East Harlem. They were married in 1952, moved to Cambridge in 1966 where Quentin practiced medicine for 28 years, and raised four daughters: Dorothy, Kathryn, Mary Elsa (deceased) and Elizabeth. They have two grandchildren.

Mary was born in Trenton, N.J. and attributes her positive outlook in life to her happy childhood and excellent marriage. Mary was a Girl Scout as a youth, which has contributed to her desire to support scouting as an adult. She attended New Jersey College for Women where she majored in sociology and psychology, and graduated determined to share her Christian faith. The Knauer's passion for missionary work through the Presbyterian Church has had them travelling both domestically and abroad. They have worked in France, Brazil, and South Africa. To celebrate 50 years of marriage, she and Quentin took part in Jimmy Carter's Habitat for Humanity project to build 100 houses in one week. She is a founding member of Cambridge Habitat for Humanity, and works with her husband serving Grace Pantry, sharing Bible study and singing in the choir at Unity Presbyterian Church. She supports The Living Word Outdoor Drama, volunteering for Young Life, and performs with the Cambridge Singers. They are involved in many other community groups and activities and have long been great supporters of Boy Scouting. "We are grateful to be cited as a couple reflecting the noble ideals of scouting," Quentin said, "And we certainly endorse the wholesome and constructive programs of the Boy and Girl Scouts of America."
